an exploration of how brain structure and cultural content interacted in the neolithic period 10 000 years ago to produce unique life patterns and belief systems what do the headless figures found in the famous paintings at Çatalhöyük in turkey have in common with the interlinked spirals carved on the monumental tombs at Newgrange and Knowth in Ireland how can the concepts of birth death and wild cast light on the changes in relationships between people and animals David Lewis Williams and David Pearce examine the intricate web of belief myth and society in the neolithic period arguably the most significant turning point in human history when agriculture became a way of life and the fractious society that we know today was born the authors focus on two contrasting times and places the beginnings in the Near East with its cult buildings and skull burials and Western Europe with its massive stone monuments they argue that neurological patterns hardwired into the brain help explain the nature of the art religion and society that neolithic people produced drawing on the latest research the authors skillfully link material on human consciousness imagery and belief systems to propose provocative new theories about religious motivation in ancient times

this book employs a new approach to the art of sixteenth century Europe by incorporating rhetoric and theory to enable a reinterpretation of elements of mannerism as being grounded in sixteenth century spirituality Lynette M F Bosch examines the conceptual vocabulary found in sixteenth century treatises on art from Giorgio Vasari to Federico Zuccari which analyses how language and spirituality complement the visual styles of mannerism by exploring the way in which writers from Leone Ebreo to Gabriele Paleotti describe the interaction between art and spirituality Bosch establishes a religious base for the language of art in sixteenth century Europe the book will be of interest to scholars working in art history Renaissance studies religious studies and religious history

attempts to understand the origins of humanity have raised fundamental questions about the complex relationship between cognition and culture central to the debates on origins is the role of religion religious ritual and religious experience what came first individual religious ecstatic experiences collective observances of transition situations fear of death ritual competence magical coercion mirror neurons or temporal lobe religiosity cognitive scientists are now providing us with important insights on phylogenetic and ontogenetic processes together with insights from the humanities and social sciences on the origins development and maintenance of complex semiotic social and cultural systems a general picture of what is particularly human about humans could emerge reflections on the preconditions for symbolic and linguistic competence and practice are now within our grasp origins of religion cognition and culture puts culture centre stage in the cognitive science of religion

human actions are often deeply intertwined with religion and can be understood in a strictly religious context yet many volumes and articles pertaining to discussions of religion in the archaeological past have focused primarily on the sociopolitical implications of such remains the authors in this volume argue that while these interpretations certainly have a meaningful place in understanding the human past they provide only part of the picture because strictly religious contexts have often been ignored this has resulted in an incomplete assessment of religious behavior in the past this volume considers exciting new directions for considering an archaeology of religion offering examples from theory tangible archaeological remains and ethnography

for most of human history we have had a close relationship with the stars once they shaped our religious beliefs power structures scientific advances and even our biology but over the last few centuries we have separated ourselves from the universe that surrounds us and it comes at a cost the human cosmos is a tour of this history from the hall of the bulls in lascaux to tahitian sailors navigating by the stars from medieval monks grappling with the nature of time to einstein realising that space and time are the same it shows we need to rediscover the universe we inhabit its effect on our health and its potential for inspiration and revelation

the breathtakingly beautiful art created deep inside the caves of western europe has the power to dazzle even the most jaded observers emerging from the narrow underground passages into the chambers of caves such as lascaux chauvet and altamira visitors are confronted with symbols patterns and depictions of bison woolly mammoths ibexes and other animals since its discovery cave art has provoked great curiosity about why it appeared when and where it did how it was made and what it meant to the communities that created it david lewis williams proposes that the explanation for this lies in the evolution of the human mind cro magnons unlike the neanderthals possessed a more advanced neurological makeup that enabled them to experience shamanistic trances and vivid mental imagery it became important for people to fix or paint these images on cave walls which they perceived as

the membrane between their world and the spirit world from which the visions came over time new social distinctions developed as individuals exploited their hallucinations for personal advancement and the first truly modern society emerged illuminating glimpses into the ancient mind are skillfully interwoven here with the still evolving story of modern day cave discoveries and research the mind in the cave is a superb piece of detective work casting light on the darkest mysteries of our earliest ancestors while strengthening our wonder at their aesthetic achievements
